Monday, January 25th

Highlights

On our first day, we were welcomed at the school's general assembly. We met Brother Francis, the principal, with whom we talked about SAAM. Later Motemi, the school's discipline coordinator, gave us a tour around Don Bosco Boys Town. The rest of the day was spent talking to the teachers and discovering all the workshops and specialities of the school.

We arrived on Sunday night. From the window seat we could see the first image of Nairobi at the same time we could feel our nerves and all our illusion. We got goosebumps when we spotted Brother Francis holding a sign and waiting for us super excited. We finally made it!!!

After so many months we were here and SAAM became REAL.





Monday morning arrived without noticing and at 8 a.m. we attended the **general** assembly starting the week. We were in the courtyard, mixed between the staff and students who were lining up, living the moment with much intensity. The ceremony to raise the Kenyan flag started, then we prayed and listened carefully to some general directions from the director, Father John. After that, we were introduced and we made a brief speech about who we are, what we do and why we were there. Most of them were already quite well informed about our role and SAAM project!

After the introduction, we met with Brother Francis and had the opportunity to talk deeper about SAAM, reviewing the agenda and talking about the project and future mobilities. At the same time, Father John, the director, briefly explained the leadership roles of Don Bosco Schools in Africa, what an amazing net!

Before leaving for the school tour that Motemy, coordinator of "discipline", had prepared for us, we signed the guest book, hoping that our signatures would be a symbol of all the traces that SAAM will leave on all of us.

Motemi took us on a visit to the different workshops: engineering blending, electricity and electronics, fashion design, builders, solar energy, plumbing, carpetees, mechanics, welding, secretary and beauty and hairdressers, where we were able to talk with the teachers. The rest of the visit included a social room, library, computer room, staff seminar and ITC room.

In fact, the education of the students is admirable. All of them attend classes with great attention and are very polite also during class change and outside of school hours. It was a pleasant first day, in which we felt very welcomed.



FACTS OF THE SCHOOL



The school requires the use of English with priority to Swahili.

Motemy ensures compliance with the rules, while guiding his 272 students (150 boarders and 22 teachers), mainly formed by young students who have lived the same way that the new students live now but with more experience, adding a lot of value to teaching.

Some workshops have a production unit, and therefore receive external orders, such as carpentry, mechanics and construction.

Guess what?

All facilities are cleaned by the teachers and students at the end of the day!





















DID YOU KNOW ?



Twiso! This is how you greet in Swahili. Also known by its native name Kiswahili, this is the most widely spoken Bantu language. In fact, it is a mix between Bantu and Arabic and was born around the 10th century.

Although the exact number of speakers is up for debate, it is the mother tongue of around 5 million people. But pay attention, as a second language, it is spoken by between 100 and 150 million people!

Highlights

On Wednesday, we met with the students to introduce them to SAAM through a non-formal education session. In the afternoon, we visited DT Dobbie, one of the most important companies that collaborate with the Don Bosco school, with Brother Francis.

We woke up with great emotion... The day to talk to the students had arrived! They are the main reason why SAAM exists and, therefore, we could not wait more to hear their feelings and opinions. The center selected two participants by specialization, who were the ones who participated in the session that we prepared. In total there were 28 young students of different ages and all of them opened up to us, letting us know about their fears and expectations.

In the afternoon **we had a visit scheduled to DT Dobbie**, so we drove to the industrial zone specialized in mechanics and automotive in the city. Throughout the visit we had a very interesting talk about DT Dobie's expectations regarding the internship program and the suitability of the students' qualifications.

Speaking about SAAM, Andrew told us that in the future it is very interesting for him to have workers who have been able to do their internships in European companies. For him, it opens their eyes to different working methods and business structures with a different model.

In addition, he also told us how much he would appreciate if the students increased their interest in environmental protection, as well as their knowledge of electrically powered automobiles. We take note of it!

FACTS OF DT DOBBIE 🕕



It is part of the largest dealer and workshop groups in Kenya. Is the most important repair shop for trucks and buses and has a huge workshop for maintenance and repair of Mercedes-Benz, Nissan and Volkswagen brands.

Every year welcomes second-year mechanics students from Don Bosco school for a 3-month internship. During this time, the students take turns in all the positions in the workshop in order to develop all the skills and abilities of a mechanic. A company tutor monitors them weekly and accredits technical learning.

DT Dobbie has an internal school-workshop. This not only allows external internship students to attend a theoretical session with their tutor, but also opens a 3-year private qualification program as a high-level mechanic. They offer theoretical classrooms and a school workshop with vehicles of high standing brands to carry out practices. This program, founded by the company itself, is controlled and accredited by the Ministry of Education.

On Thursday, we worked mainly on the strategy with the Don Bosco Tech Africa network and learned about the schools that are part of it. We were joined by Father George, DBTA director Father TJ, project manager Roland Kornhaeusl, communication and administration managers Nancy Ndung'u and Lucy Musili Nzambi, and project technician Jean Nepo.

Depending on what is sold in them, they are concentrated by areas.

Most of them are second-hand, because recycling over waste prevails in the city.

The residence is pretty well located, just 150m from the School, on the other side of the road. The building is surrounded by a closed field and with a large portal that remains closed day and night. How cute are the animals you can find outside of the building: cows, goats, rabbits and chickens!

During our stay, our new family was composed of 7 sisters (4 novices and 3 nuns) in which Sister Margareth is the superior one. Our sisters carry out the hard and lovely task of taking care of the poor and orphaned children of the city and help in dining rooms and slams. If you are wondering if they speak English.... They all do!

In this lovely residence, we can find accommodation for 36 people in single and double rooms, and many people use it throughout the year, so they are very used to attending external people with great charm, that always characterizes them.

The schedules despite being marked on the welcome sheet are adapted to each case. At least that's how they did it with us. Everyday we were asked what were our preferences for breakfast and if we were going to have lunch or dinner there.
