

I am Alfredo Garmendia, Head of the International Affairs of Centro San Viator, where I have been working for the last 20 years. I have a bachelor's degree in Anglo-Germanic studies.

For the last 18 years I have combined my job as project manager with teaching to young students with fewer opportunities, so somehow I work mixing two of my passions.

From our department, we lead different initiatives into Erasmus+ -Youth, School, VET, adult and Higher Education - and others, such as AMIF, etc. Our long experience in EU projects has been determining to establish solid networks, especially in the Automotive and Third Sector.

Arriving in Liberia

Saturday, June 12th

We started our day really early. We had our first flight at 7 am from Bilbao's airport. The best option for us was going from Bilbao to Frankfurt, from there to Brussels, and once in Brussels we took the flight to Monrovia, with a technical stop in Freetown, Sierra Leona.



Unfortunately, the luck wasn't in our side, and we had a delay of 5 hours, which made us arrive late at night in Monrovia. Once there, we got checked our temperature and they verified if we had already paid our COVID tests. It is compulsory to take one PCR at your arrival in the country; you can pay it in advance through the national app or pay it with dollars or by credit card once you are there.







After filling all the documents, we got COVID tested and visa checked. The visa check doesn't take too much time but for the PCR you must be patient. After that, we collected our luggage and Father Sony was already waiting for us in the parking. He drove us to the Don Bosco Technical High School where we are staying this week. The school has facilities that can be used by the guests.

The day started great. We had the chance to have a good rest at night and enjoy the morning working from the playground tables.

On Sunday, we met Nuria, a worker from EKI that works with this VET center. EKI is in charge of the installation of the solar panels in the school, but they also have prepared a training course for the VET center about solar energy that will start to be taught in the new school year.



After lunch, Nuria had to go to the **Nuncio**'s house in Monrovia and she invited us to go with them. We had the chance to **introduce SAAM** to him and to exchange some thoughts about the different challenges that may arrive.

Also this day, we met the entire Salesian congregation: Father Fredrick, Father Sony, Father Samuel and Brother Lucian.


Monday, June 14th



Wednesday, June 16th

Evelyn Pajibou, worker of Father Sony's parrish, was our guide for this day.

She took us in a **tour around Monrovia**, from the university, where she studies agriculture, to the beach, going through a lot of **markets**. The first of the markets was a local one, where you could see from fish and meat to all kind of species.

After that, we went to an **ancient hotel**, destroyed by the war, where you could see the entire city from the top. **The city of Monrovia is impressive**, **situated in the coast**, **with a nice beach**.

We had the chance to go to one market, a big one, when we say big, we mean really big. We haven't seen one as big as this one.

From the parrish, we went back to Don Bosco walking, there is about 1 km from one side to another. We did feel safe all the time around the city, we moved basically in small cars made out of a motorcycle called KEKE, similar of what we call TUK TUK.

Thursday, June 17th

First thing in the morning it was the assembly. As guests they requested us to speak and Alfredo gave a speech about education.

Fast after that, we had to run to get our **PCR** done. It took us around 3 hours to have everything done and once we had our PCR done we went back to the school. We had an appointment with the teachers from electricity. First we filmed with 4 students 2 different videos about solar energy explained by them and then we had a talk with the three teachers we explained to them the project and they had some questions that we tried to answer.





After lunch, we had an appointment with the **European Delegation in Liberia**, the European deputy wasn't there, but we met two colleagues of him, a Finish man and a Liberian woman. This was our last day with Nuria, she went back to Spain that afternoon.

Friday, June 18th

We woke up with good news, our covid test had already appear and we were both negative, the results arrived really guick. This morning we got to do our luggage, talk with some people from the school and make all the documents needed to go back home (QR for entering Belgium, QR for entering Spain, boarding passes, etc...). After our last lunch with the congregation, we went to the top of the school to enjoy the nice views of Monrovia and to see the solar panels installed on the roof.

Then Father Sony took us to the airport. The way from the school is about 2 hours, even a bit more, there is lot of traffic so this needs to be taken into account.

Once in the airport we had to show our documents several times, it took us about an hour to do all the things. Around 9 pm we took the plane from Monrovia, the journey went well and without any incidence, arriving to Bilbao at 14 pm on Saturday.
