Since we arrived late at night, we slept in and we woke up quite late on Sunday. The hotel is so nice and fancy and we slept really comfortably.

At 5:30 pm, the chauffeur picked me up to take me to Thiès:

On my way to **Thiès**, I was very surprised about the changes of the landscape. Dakar city is crowded and it's surrounded by desert. But step by step on the way you can enjoy the **baobabs trees** and arriving in Thiés, I was pleased to see so many trees along the road like in my home country. My first impression about Thiés was very nice, a **big city without buildings**, with a lot of small stands at the **streets**. I felt like crossing a huge village.





When I arrived in Medina Fall center, **Father Antonio and Father Jean** came to greet me. I was quite lucky because I arrived just at the same time of a local Christian **celebration** (Caritas) with the community.

They introduced me to all the people there present. Some kids were playing football in the courtyard. Then, they showed me my room and the common space of the community.

My room is very humble and at the same time it has everything I need (private bathroom, big bed, desk...). The very good points are the mosquito nets and a brand new air conditioning! What a great surprise! Also they we very kind to leave a lot of bottles of water. I already feel like home!

After setting up my room, we went to a **local restaurant with father Jean Lemondo** (Director of the community part), Father Antonio (Director) and Germain (Head of Studies). We started to talk about the agenda of the next day and we had a very nice dinner (I chose fish again, a grilled dorade, I recommend it!).





CULTURAL FACT -

I was very impressed by seeing so many **sheeps** at the street. The driver said that on the 21st of July, Muslims will celebrate **TABASKI** which is the equivalent of 'Aïd el-Kebir in Senegal. Each married man has to buy and kill a sheep and then the family will eat it together.

Father Antonio told me that Christians can also be invited to this celebration. Muslims are the majority in Senegal and the different religions are well respected.

It was very moving for me to be in front of the whole school for the first time. (Later, I noticed that all of them reminded my name and came to me, wishing to interact with me in French and in Wolof).





The planning of the morning was quite intense because we had to meet the regional academic inspection of Thiès. We met first Mr. Diasse, the inspector.

In the afternoon, I met the the Association of students' parents to present SAAM.

6 parents came to the meeting and I could explain to them the project and especially ask their opinion about a mobility of their children to understand their expectations and also their concerns. It was very interesting to get their feedback and see their enthusiasm about mobilities and also their worries about the fact that they could choose to stay illegally in Europe and would not wish to come back home. We discussed how we could avoid this situation and this should be thought from the beginning when we prepare the students, choose them, and anticipate their role upon their return. With the center, a strong support of insertion have to be planned before their mobility to help them with their insertion and the employability capacity. The parents praised the project and thanked the school for all that it has allowed them.

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At school, the children receive professional education, but also personal and educational training. I notice the difference at home in his behaviour.

The future for Africa and for Senegal is with the VET education. We need employability so that young people can lead the country in the future.

In the early morning I went to visit Ms. Clarisse Liautaud, European delegate deputy director of the cooperation section of European Union in Senegal. Every morning I was having my breakfast with Antonio, Jean and Germain, who are the 3 Salesians of the centers (Carlos was on holidays at this time).

In the morning, 3 visits to factories where some students are doing internships and some of them found a job were planned.

Local cereals factory. François told me that this factory is one which will save the country. There, we met the responsible of the production. We made a tour of the factory and he presented us with the 2 news members (one student of DB doing his internship for the BT (Brevet de Technicien) and another one who just finished his studies in DB and has just been hired on a fixed-term contract.



KIRENE

Water and drinks factory. It's a local factory leaded by a Senegalese entrepreneur. We met **Mr. Diatta**, responsible for the production. We visited the factory and we met one old student of **Don Bosco** who got the job there thanks to his CAP. Also, other previous students of Don Bosco are actually working in the factory.















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Mr. Diatta explained to us that he recognizes the professionalism of the center and has a special attention to the resumes that are sent with the training of their center. The Don Bosco students also go to Kirene for technical visits and internships.







Visit to the Bishop

In the afternoon, we met Monseigneur l'Abbé Pierre Aye Ndione, Diocese of Education of Thiès. We presented SAAM and he thanked us for this big project:

"The meeting between Europe and Africa should lead to a win-win partnership"

He explained to me that the VET center Don Bosco offers a lots of opportunities for the youth. In the past, it was not a prepared location and today the trend is reversing.





















Wednesday, July 7th

We woke up and had a quick breakfast to go straight to **Diamniadio**, a brand new city in Senegal located in between Dakar and Thiès where the **Ministries** and the most important national **institutions** are all located.

We had a very interesting and fruitful meeting with Ms. Maimouna Diakhaté and Mr. Ousama Seck, representatives from the Ministry of VET and Employability. We presented SAAM and the impact it will have in Senegal. They were really astonished by the project and they look forward to it. They kindly offered their help and support to guide and help us during all the challenges we will find moving people to and from Senegal.



Once we arrived to the Don Bosco center, all the students were gathered together in the conference room. There, we did some activities to break the ice and to get to know them. Then, we presented SAAM in detail, focusing on the 3rd phase: Students mobility. After that, we opened the mic to listen to them. They all have questions, doubts, expectations...and it is essential to listen to all of them to try to provide the best experience ever.

After the session with students, we ate quite fast to go straight to a **session with teachers and trainers**. We talked about SAAM in detail, going through **each single objective**, **phase and activity to have everything understood from both parties** (coordination team and partner). All the teachers listened carefully and were motivated by all the explanations. **You could see through their eyes they were all looking forward to starting the project in Senegal**. We had a very interesting discussion about all the challenges and specific points SAAM could find in Senegal and in the Don Bosco VET centre of Thiès. But, more importantly, we all agreed that all together can face that and overcome whatever defiance.























Finally, we went to visit a **public VET center in Thiès**. Mr. Gueye (Works Manager) welcomed us and introduced to us the different workshops. This school has 3 general sectors (industry, agriculture and tertiary) and around 2000 students including 1300 in VET. The two schools have exchanges. For example, their students go to Don Bosco to use some machines in the mechanical section because Don Bosco is better equipped for practice.

Thursday, July 8th

Today we worked at the VET center. We had a working session in the different classrooms and workshops to live and experience the day-to-day at the school.

We did a very nice activity with the students to talk about:

- What do they know about Europe
- Which are their expectations about their mobility
- What are their fears of going to Europe
- Which are their strengths they want to share when they arrive at a European VET center

Also during the morning, we talked about SAAM with Father Antonio, Father Jean, and François on the Thiès local radio. It was such a nice experience and a good dissemination of the project because Françoise was translating the speeches to Wolof (the local language). Nevertheless, the most incredible thing we experienced was the power outage! But like everything in the country, they find fast solutions to every single problem and we recorded the end of the interview with an old voice recorder and the phone light!

Finally we met the Major of Thiès North where the VET centre is located. We talked about SAAM and he offered his hand and support to the project and to Don Bosco center during the mobility procedures. We achieved our mission of involving almost all the important players to execute the project in Senegal.



In the afternoon, we went back to the workshops to get in touch with the students. We could do some interviews of teachers and staff and also some students of the electricity department gave demonstration of an electrical assembly by explaining their group work.

Tonight is the night!

The school prepared a party for us. They invited all the students to come back in the afternoon to show us a traditional party with a live band. It was incredible to see some students dancing amazingly. We joined them but the rhythm is quite hard to follow for our European dance style. This night was a fantastic way to discover the culture.





















Friday, July 9th

On Friday, we had **"our day off"**. We woke up early in the morning to take the car for almost three hours to go to **Saint Louis**, one of the most beautiful and touristic places in Senegal and it is a "must" to do when visiting the country.

The team was composed by Father Germain, from Togo, Father Antonio (Spain), the VET centre principal, Father Jean (Benin) the Salesia Community Director, Manon and Sergio. What a team!



We drove through **national roads to get to the north of the country**. In the way, we found so many small villages and we could see the day-to-day life of local people. Small business, fruit everywhere, home-made furniture and a lot of lambs and baobabs are the typical things you can find as a landscape.

The little oceanic city was the political capital of the colony and French West Africa (FWA) until 1902, and capital of Senegal and Mauritania until 1957, before falling into decline due to the transfer of the capital to Dakar.

The city is divided into three parts: The continental side, where all the industry and most of the city life happens. The colonial island, where all the historical buildings and monuments are located and the part of the city placed in the Langue de Barbarie. Langue de Barbarie is a 600 km (370 mi) long stretch of sand from Nouadhibou in Mauritania to Saint-Louis, over a stretch of 25 km (16 mi) separating the lower Senegal River from the Atlantic Ocean. There is the city of the fishermen and it is very very crowded and full of young people!

Saturday, July 10th

We woke up very very very early (5am!) to go to Dakar to do the **PCR test**. The PCR test can be done in Thiès but just during the week and because of our flight time we had to go to Dakar. **There, the whole process was really awesome and well-organized.** Despite the low resources compared with the hospitals we have visited in Europe, the organization, waiting rooms and waiting times were even better than the hospitals in Europe! And there were so many people waiting for the test.

Then, we went to have **breakfast at the Salesian Community in Dakar**, where, as in every Salesian school visited, **the community and the people were very welcoming and friendly.**

When arriving in Thiès, Father Jean suggested that we should stop at the artisanal village where **a lot of hand craft and local souvenirs are made.** It was nice to walk and buy some souvenirs in some stands. A great way of ending our fantastic Senegalese experience!























Sunday, July 11th

For going back home on Sunday, we repeated the same journey: **layover in Lisbon** and finally arriving in Madrid!

Jàmm rekk, Alxamdulilaay. - Very fine, thanks to God!

Alxamdulilaay! - Grace to God!

Dieredieuf! - Thank you!

Tiouke na! - That's fine!

Yow nak - And you?
